



NOSF Turns 20!

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The 2018-2019 school year is a very special one for the Northwest Ohio Scholarship Fund. What makes it so special is that this year marks the 20th year of awarding scholarships. The first school year NOSF started awarding scholarships was 1999-2000. That year there were 836 scholarships awarded worth \$553,794. More than 6,600 children from Wood, Lucas and Fulton Counties applied that year for the random drawing.

There were 836 students selected to receive a scholarship worth 25%, 50%, or 75% of their tuition to attend a private school.

The Northwest Ohio Scholarship Fund was formed when a group of local philanthropists raised pledges totaling \$1 million.

This secured local participation for matching funds from the Children's Scholarship Fund (CSF). The Children's Scholarship Fund was founded by John Forstmann and John Walton in 1998 who shared a passion for helping low-income children escape poverty by providing educational opportunities. CSF was officially launched in 1998 by offering 40,000 K-8 scholarships worth almost \$200 million to families across America. Since 1998:

- 166,000 CSF scholarships worth \$741 million have been awarded nationwide
- 15,400 NOSF scholarships worth \$13.2 million have been awarded in Northwest Ohio
- CSF has matched \$4.5 million in funds for scholarships locally

Today NOSF is one of 27 partners along with the Children's Scholarship Fund that work together to maximize educational opportunities for those in need by offering tuition assistance.

2018-2019 NOSF Scholarship Statistics:

- 750 scholarships awarded to students
- 471 returning students received scholarships
- 265 new students were awarded scholarships
- \$1,088 was the average scholarship awarded
- Students attend 72 different private schools or are homeschooled

Playgrounds are Her Passion –

NOSF Graduate Mylicia Rangel, Queen of Apostles Class 2011

Mylicia Rangel is a senior Recreational Therapy major at The University of Toledo. She is also a NOSF alumna. Along with her four siblings, Mylicia attended Queen of Apostles School with a NOSF scholarship. Her path to Recreational Therapy started while she was attending Central Catholic High School and volunteering at Sunshine Children's Home. She always knew that she wanted to do some type of therapy with people. She started as a Physical Therapy major at The University of Toledo and then decided to switch to Recreational Therapy.

The study of Recreational Therapy also known as Therapeutic Recreation is defined as *a systematic process that utilizes recreation and other activity-based interventions to address the assessed needs of individuals with illnesses and or disabling conditions.*

While taking an Inclusive Recreation class at UT, she had an opportunity to visit an inclusive playground in Port Clinton. An inclusive playground is designed for children of all abilities to have a safe place to play and is developmentally appropriate.

Ms. Rangel is working on a project called the **Inclusive Playground Project** for the City of Toledo. The playground is in the design phase and her hope is that it will be located at Ottawa Park. Ms. Rangel said, "This project was started to create and build an accessible and inclusive playground within the Toledo community because all kids should be able to play."

When Ms. Rangel is not working on developing the playground, she is going to classes, mentoring freshmen as a Mentor for Students for first generation college students, serving as the Community Service Chair of the Latino Student Union, and working as a Recreation Assistant. She also just recently accepted a paid internship with the Parks, Recreation, and Forestry department for the City of Toledo. And will be working to improve inclusivity and accessibility in their parks and playgrounds while also moving forward on her playground project for the city.

Sr. Joselyn Weeman from Queen of Apostles School said this about Ms. Rangel, "It was a joy to have Mylicia Rangel in my 3rd Grade classroom at Queen of Apostles. She was the kind of 3rd grader that all teachers want. Mylicia was so responsible, hardworking, bright, and happy and was an angel helping out wherever she could. She came back to visit last year and I am so proud of her now! God is blessing her with a happy future!"
