### From the Executive Director —

### **ACE Parental Choice Symposium**

his past month I got to spend an amazing time with a fine group of people. I was a participant in the University of Notre Dame's Alliance for Catholic Education (ACE) Parental Choice Symposium hosted over five days, three in New Orleans and two in Tampa. I was invited to attend as a representative of the Children's Scholarship Fund (CSF), NOSF's

At the symposium I was able to meet and learn from some of the nation's top parental choice leaders as well as get first-hand experience of parent's choice's impact on families, communities, and educational systems.

Friday's program was titled the *History and Reality of Educational Choice* with Howard Fuller the Chair and Co-Founder of the Black Alliance for Educational Options (BAEO). Dr. Fuller is regarded as one of the nation's most influential African-American spokesman for school choice. The second day, I learned about the *Legislative and Legal Dimensions of Parental Choice* with Scott Jensen of the American Federation for Children and John Schoenig from the University of Notre Dame. The last day in New Orleans Dr. Patrick Wolf of the University of Arkansas spoke on *The Researched Case for Parental Choice and the Future of Parental Choice Advocacy*.

While in New Orleans I also saw first-hand some of the unlikely benefits of Hurricane Katrina including the birth of school choice with vouchers and charter schools. Kenneth Campbell, the president of BAEO spoke about his efforts as founding director of charter schools at the Louisiana Department of Education. He helped engineer the rebuilding of New Orleans's education infrastructure through charter schools and implemented innovative strategies to transform failing schools across the state.

From there, I traveled with the 44 participants to Tampa, Florida where we were introduced to the founder and staff of the state's largest tax credit scholarship program, *Step Up for Students*. I was introduced to John Kirtley, the chairman of *Step Up for Students*, and

venture capitalist. In 1998 Kirtley started his own foundation to fund private school scholarships for low-income children and in 2001, persuaded the Florida legislature to create a statewide tax-credit scholarship program. *Step Up for Students* now provides 33,000 scholarships to low-income students across the state.

It was a fabulous trip and I enjoyed meeting so many future educators from the ACE program. Many of them are now teaching in urban areas across the country. Getting to know them gave me lots of hope for children and education. – *Ann Riddle* 



### New Book by Naomi Shaefer Riley Shows Transformational Impact of K-8 Scholarships

n June, Opportunity and Hope: Transforming Lives through Scholarships hit the shelves. This book written by New York Post Columnist



and former Wall Street Journal editor Naomi Schaefer Riley tells the stories of ten scholarship alumni from Children's Scholarship Fund partners as well as a Washington

DC's Opportunity Scholarship Program and a student who received a Step Up for Student scholarship.

The scholarship alumni profiled in the book are representative of thousands of others, including the 12,200 students who have received scholarships from the Northwest Ohio Scholarship Fund since 1999.

"Naomi Schaefer Riley has an ear for stories that make a difference. The accounts of the young people profiled in the book are inspirational and instructive: A little help can go a long way in transforming the prospects for students who are trapped in schools that don't work," said Mike McCurry, Chairman of Children's Scholarship Fund and former White House Press Secretary.

Founded in 1998, the Children's Scholarship Fund (CSF) provides scholarships to low-income families so their children can attend the private K-8 schools that best meet their needs, regardless of their ability to pay or where they live. Since its inception, CSF has awarded scholarships worth \$568 million to 139,000 children. This past school year, CSF, with its 27 partner programs, funded scholarships for 27,650 lowincome children across the country.




# NOSF Partners with the Toledo Bar to Present Planned Giving Seminar
